On 3 August 2014, the SingTel Singapore Cancer Society Race Against Cancer (RAC) rallied people from all ages and walks of life to offer solidarity to those who have been affected by cancer. This year, Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) achieved a record of \$1 million raised to further its mission of 'minimising cancer and maximising life'. Title sponsor SingTel made a generous \$250,000 donation from its Touching Lives Fund to support the SCS Help the Children and Youth programme.

Preparation for RAC began months ahead, with dedicated individual and corporate volunteers contributing their valuable time and energy to prepping race packs and registering participants. A total of 22 corporate sponsors contributed funds, goods, and services, which ranged from the provision of beverages and race bibs to sun screen

Despite the threat of thunderstorms, some 7000 enthusiastic runners assembled at East Coast Park, Angsana Green, to support our cause. There was a place

for runners of every stripe – from serious racers to leisurely strollers, corporate teams and even entire families – all were united in a common cause: to celebrate life and to take a stand against cancer. SCS Charity Athletes also made a strong showing at this year's RAC. In addition, 700 volunteers stepped forward to manage race logistics and to ensure safety.

Mr Lawrence Wong, Minister for Culture, Community and Youth & Second Minister for Ministry of Communications and Information, reprised his role as the Guest of Honour. He also accompanied 70 SCS beneficiaries as they walked a portion of the race route together, and took an interest in the Society's wide range of programmes and services at the corporate showcase tent. SCS Cancer Support featured activities such as sign language instruction and jewellery making.

SCS council members, management, and staff sincerely thank all runners, volunteers, donors, sponsors, beneficiaries, and people of goodwill for the success of RAC 2014.

First-Ever Women's Gynaecological Cancer Awareness Campaign

Singapore saw the launch of its first-ever Women's Gynaecological Cancer Awareness Campaign from July 2014 till September 2014. The campaign was initiated by the Singapore Cancer Society (SCS), supported by the Health Promotion Board (HPB), KK Women's and Children's Hospital, National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS), Parkway Cancer Centre and Singapore General Hospital, to create greater awareness towards three women's gynaecological cancers - uterine, ovarian and cervical cancers, which are among the top 10 cancers diagnosed in Singapore women.

"Our women have always dedicated their heart and soul to taking care of their families, and many times, placed their individual welfare last. By launching Singapore's first-ever Women's Gynaecological Cancer Awareness Campaign this year, we are committed to educating our women in knowing that gynaecological cancers can affect all across generations. It is time that we celebrate the gift of motherhood and womanhood by raising awareness of these cancers through public education of its risk factors, symptoms and signs. We also want to encourage regular Pap smear screening (once every three years) among women aged 25 years and above, for early detection of cervical cancer."

Gynaecological cancer refers to any cancer of a woman's reproductive organs. Each gynaecological cancer is unique, with its own different signs, symptoms and risk factors. It is essential for women to be aware and pay attention to their bodies so that they can recognise the signs and seek appropriate treatment early.

According to the Singapore Cancer Registry's Interim Annual Registry Report - Trends in Cancer Incidence in Singapore, 2009 - 2013, uterine cancer is the fourth most common cancer (6.3%) diagnosed among Singapore women. It has scaled up from being the seventh most common cancer among Singapore women a decade ago. The incidence of new uterine cancer cases has also more than doubled from 904 in 1998-2002 to 1,910 in 2009-2013. Ovarian cancer is the fifth most common cancer (5.4%) diagnosed among Singapore women, and the number of cases has increased by 55% since 1998-2002. Cervical cancer is the 10th most common cancer (3.2%) diagnosed among Singapore women. It has gone down from being the fifth most common cancer diagnosed in 1998-2002.

Women are stronger than we think. They are also more vulnerable than they know. Remind the women in our lives that they are always on our minds by encouraging them to stay vigilant and up to date with screening for cervical cancer. Free Pap smear screening is available to eligible women at the Singapore Cancer Society Multi-Service Centre at Bishan. Telephone: 6499 9133

Public forums

Some 600 participants attended the English and Mandarin Women's Gynaecological Cancer public forums held at Suntec Singapore Convention & Exhibition Centre. Topics included 'Is pregnancy possible after cancer treatment?', 'I have irregular bleeding, should I be worried? Menopause or cancer?', 'My mom has ovarian cancer, will I get it?' and 'Fertility sparing'.

Free Pap smear screening

As part of the Women's Gynaecological Cancer Awareness Campaign, SCS had also collaborated with 149 general practitioner clinics islandwide to provide free Pap smear screening from 1 July to 30 September 2014 to all female Singaporeans and Permanent Residents aged between 25 and 69 who are or have been sexually-active but have not had a Pap smear test in the preceding three years. This is to further promote and encourage regular Pap smear screening and early detection of cervical cancer. SCS has been providing free Pap smear screening services at its clinic since 1969.

Celebrity power



The FIT50 Project is an initiative by the Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) to mark our 50th anniversary.

The FIT50 Project aims to encourage those entering their silver years to stay "FIT" and adopt regular cancer screening as a way of life for the three commonly diagnosed cancers affecting Singaporeans.

This year, SCS provides sponsored cancer screening services, including Pap smear test, mammogram, and FIT (Faecal Immunochemical Test) kits to eligible Singaporeans born in 1964 through invitation letters from the Health Promotion Board to sign up for the free cancer screenings.





Prof Cynthia Goh Comes Full Circle

Associate Professor Cynthia Goh is determined to ensure that everyone who needs palliative care should get it and that a range of hospice and hospital palliative services is available to people suffering from life-limiting illnesses today.

Since 1986, A/Prof Goh has been one of the pioneers of the hospice movement in Singapore. She was involved in starting the first hospice home care service in Singapore, under the auspices of Singapore Cancer Society (SCS), which later became independent as the Hospice Care Association (HCA Hospice Care). From 1994 to 1999, she was Medical Director of Assisi Home and Hospice, and presently sits on the Assisi Hospice Board.

A/Prof Goh is back to where she first started the hospice (home care movement). In April this year, A/Prof Goh returned as a Visiting Consultant to share her invaluable insights built on her years of experience in spearheading the growth of the palliative care sector in Singapore with our doctors and nurses at SCS Hospice Care. A/Prof Goh provides guidance on field training to our doctors and nurses, and also offers professional patient consultation and advice on case management. Her expertise and guidance are pivotal in building the capacity and capabilities of the SCS Hospice Care team.

A/Prof Goh has dedicated her career to the development and establishment of palliative medicine as a specialty. The fruits of her labours have benefitted many patients and their families who are supported to the end. Since 1996, she has nurtured the development of the Asia Pacific Hospice Palliative Care Network, legally registered in 2001 in Singapore, to support the development of palliative care in the Asia-Pacific

region, which she currently chairs. In 1999, she started the Department of Palliative Medicine at the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), leading to palliative care services being established in all public sector hospitals in Singapore and palliative medicine to be recognised as a medical sub-specialty in Singapore in 2006.

A/Prof Goh is an Internal Medicine specialist by training, with a PhD in Molecular Biology. She currently practises as an accredited specialist in palliative medicine at the Division of Palliative Medicine, NCCS.

SCS currently has three Visiting Consultants on board, namely A/Prof Cynthia Goh, Dr Kok Jaan Yang, and Dr Norhisham Main. These specialists in palliative medicine ensure that the SCS team of doctors and nurses are kept abreast with the best practices in palliative care.

Beyond palliative care, SCS also provides psychosocial services with a dedicated team of medical social workers and counsellors to provide the necessary psychosocial support at home.

Singapore Cancer Society is the first secular Voluntary Welfare Organisation in Singapore to include in its Hospice Care team, a Spiritual Care Professional.

At SCS, spiritual care is about caring for our patients and their loved ones. It focuses on patients' and their families' own personal belief systems, core values, and relationships that they share in the communities they belong to. This enables them to make better sense of the difficulties and challenges they face as they seek to find meaning and purpose in their cancer journey. Having a Spiritual Care Professional on the psychosocial services team emphasises SCS' commitment to providing total care, not only for SCS hospice home care patients but also to provide expertise and support for SCS survivorship programmes.

There is also a full-time Occupational Therapist who provides home rehabilitation assessment. In addition, patients who are in need of the necessary medical equipment are able to freely loan some of these equipment from SCS.

Singapore Cancer Society provides holistic hospice care for patients with advanced cancer in the comfort of their own homes. The SCS Hospice Care team comprises Medical, Nursing and Allied health professionals who make regular visits to our patients and families. With the strengthened team of palliative care professionals and \$10 million budgeted over the next five years, SCS is working towards the projected scale up of its hospice care services.

Singapore Cancer Society (SCS), Duke-NUS Graduate Medical School, and Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine organised the first 3-day Camp FERO for SCS beneficiaries at the Singapore Zoological Gardens in June 2014.

Camp FERO (Fun, Empowering, Resilience, Overnight) had its theme 1 Have, I Can, I Am' integrated into all activities to address issues and challenges faced by the 21 participants aged between 11 and 20 years, who are from families impacted by cancer. Through guided daily reflection sessions and affirmation from their peers, the youths discovered their strengths, realised what they could achieve during the days' activities, and learned about their own resilience and discovered who they are as individuals.



Conquering their fear of heights, the campers put aside their hesitation and gamely went on the Forest Adventure.

The objective of Camp FERO was to raise awareness among the young campers of the resources available to support them as they grow into adulthood. With this goal, SCS planned fun sessions on self-discovery and character-building for them. Besides physically-challenging activities and bonding exercises, an integral part of the camp was the guided self-reflection time carried out at the end of each day.



Participants reflected on the day's activities and created personal boards documenting their self-discoveries and achievements and exchanged notes of encouragement with fellow campers.



Campers were also involved in setting up and tearing down the tents.

The Singapore Zoological Gardens was a perfect place for the camp. Campers were most excited to camp on grounds surrounded by 'wildlife' despite having to forgo the comfort of their bedrooms, enduring the scorching heat during the day and relentless downpours at night. From the get go, the campers warmed up to each other readily, forged friendships, and cultivated a team spirit that served to help them get through the challenging activities during the camp.

"It was my first time facilitating a youth camp outside of church in a volunteering capacity. It has been fun seeing them grow and bond; these children did not speak to each other before but were working together. It was a very rewarding process," remarked Tan Jon Wei, Camp FERO Facilitator, and a first year NUS medical student.

"One of the key activities was 'SCS FERO', which focused on developing 'connecting behaviours' aimed at reminding us that one can

choose to react positively in negative circumstances. This activity helped us to manage and control our emotions better and adopt a positive outlook on the things that frustrate or annoy us. I will try to be more positive and calm during difficult circumstances," reflected Syafiqah, 19.

At the closing campfire, Mr Albert Ching, Chief Executive Officer of SCS, encouraged the campers to continue strengthening their friendships beyond Camp FERO. He also reminded them that the qualities they have discovered in themselves during the camp could be employed in their personal lives.

Coming from similar backgrounds and experiences, you may share certain challenges in life. Many a times, it is better to journey with someone else. I am sure that during the last three days, each of you had helped, affirmed, supported, and encouraged one another. That is what life is all about. We should continually be thankful and to give to others who are in need. In different circumstances in our lives, we can make a difference to people around us, especially for some of us. You can be a pillar of strength and hope in your home front. There are many things you can achieve. Uncover the potential in you. We hope to see you back as volunteers or campers to help us reach out to more people, to strengthen this community of care, and to grow together.


